



Extra Effort: New Auburn's Lunemann conquers Asperger's syndrome

NEW AUBURN— In a situation that can be difficult to control, New Auburn's Colton Lunemann never wavered.

With a medical condition that tries to isolate, Lunemann wouldn't allow himself to be alone.

The New Auburn senior has overcome a childhood diagnosis of Asperger's syndrome to become one of the most active and outgoing students in his class, participating in a variety of extracurricular activities while handling a condition that can make those public situations tough to handle.

This spring, Lunemann will walk at his senior graduation as his class' salutatorian. The senior has come a long way and thanks to the support of his family, classmates and teachers, shows no signs of slowing down.

Lunemann is New Auburn High School's 2016 recipient of Chippewa Valley Newspapers' Extra Effort award.

Avoiding isolation

He was diagnosed with Asperger's syndrome as a youngster. Asperger's is a pervasive development disorder that delays the development of certain skills, most notably social skills, communication skills and imagination skills. Often times, children with Asperger's have difficulty forging friendships and relationships, especially as they grow older.

"With Asperger's, my biggest problem was when I was very young, "Lunemann said. "My mom said I wouldn't really speak any words until I was 3 years old."

Lunemann and his family attacked Colton's condition head-on, not allowing him to isolate himself.

"Being around people like them I think is what helped me the most," Lunemann said of his family. "They were supportive of me and did help me and I really learned more from them than anybody else."

Lunemann joined the Cub Scouts in the first grade, an organization that weaved his love of being outdoors into social interaction. He stayed involved with the organization and later earned the coveted title of Eagle Scout. He has also become involved with the Future Farmers of America, National Honor Society, Student Council and competed athletically in cross country.

"I think being active in all these groups really does help you cope with having Asperger's" Lunemann said. "It's forced -upon communication and I think that's one of the best ways you can learn. You just learn by doing stuff."

Lunemann hasn't just participated in those organizations, he has thrived. He earned a silver medal in the state FFA agri-science competition in the Animal Systems category. He also has performed with organization's state band as an alto saxophonist, playing at the state FFA convention as well as at the Wisconsin State Fair.

"I really admire him for his efforts and for what he does to represent our school and community, "said New Auburn High School agriculture teacher Brenda Scheil.

College plans

Lunemann's love for the outdoors can be seen in the organizations he is involved with, as well as with his intended path of secondary education. He plans on attending college and studying Actuary Science, a rapidly-growing field that applies math and statistical methods to access risks for insurance, finance and a variety of other industries and fields.

"Actuary science, from what I've learned so far, has a wide variety of things you can possibly do," Lunemann said. "You can work for insurance companies; you can work with the government and do more environmental things. That's something I'm interested in getting into. There's a large field you can get into and I think it would be the best place for me to go right now."

"Colton values education and what I like about Colton is he always has a goal on the horizon and is willing to work towards it and achieve it," Scheil said.

After his Asperger's diagnosis, Lunemann was introduced to a book by a speech therapist that showed children diagnosed with Asperger's the importance of finding themselves and discovering what type of person they

As Lunemann closes in on graduation with a bright future ahead, he has done just that. He's conquered a condition that preys on social vulnerability and has become an out going, productive member of his community.

As he closes in on the next stage of his life, those around him have noticed the gains he has made. And the success that con come with it.

"He recognizes that talents he has and he wants to share them with the world," Scheil said. "He's going to be successful just for that ability to want to share his talents."

Positive Family Communication: The Importance of an Open Door submitted by Ms. Sheskey

Sometimes conversations with young people-especially your own children-can become confrontational. Learning to listen can help prevent slamming doors and, instead, open them. Though challenging, being available for frequent, in-depth conversations is an important role parents and other adult family members can play in children's livesfrom the time they learn to talk all the way into adulthood. The goal is to promote and maintain an open-door policy. Ask openended questions and then listen, listen, listen. Positive Family Communication is Asset 2 of Search Institute's 40 Developmental Assets, the qualities, experiences, and relationships that help young people grow up healthy, caring, and responsible. Here are the facts

Research shows that young peo-

ple who experience positive communication with their parents are more likely to grow up healthy and are more willing to seek their parents' advice and counsel. About 28 percent of young people, ages 11-18, enjoy positive communication with their parents and are willing to seek their parents' counsel and advice, according to Search Institute surveys. Practice consistently communicating-talking and listening to young people-with an open mind and heart.

Tips for building this asset Positive communication also means listening to understand a young person's perspective, not to advocate your position. Be available when young people need you—and even when they

think they don't. Take good care of yourself so when your children want to talk, you can give them your full attention. Also try this

In your home and family: Make it easy for your child to spend time talking with you: Keep an extra stool or chair in the kitchen, den, home office, or workshop area. When you're in the car together is a great time to chat, too.

In your neighborhood and community: Ask young people you know caring questions, such as: What was the best thing about school today? What was the best act in the talent show? Why? Listen to their answers and respond accordingly.

In your school or youth program: During parent meet-

ings, discuss the importance of positive communication between parents and children.

school."

Helen Glaser, a sophomore at New Auburn High School, presented at two different sessions during the conference. Helen is an Employment First Ambassador for the Board for People with Developmental Disabilities (www.wi bpdd.org.) As an ambassador, Helen believes in the importance of community employment for people with disabilities. During the first session Helen presented her program titled "Speak up-it's YOUR Transition Plan." During her presentation session Helen spoke to students about how important it was to "be in the driver's seat" at your IEP (Individualized Educational Plan) meeting. She shared how she ran her own IEP and it felt good to be in control of her meeting and be in control of the terminology understand all of the terminology Helen said, "It's and what it meant. Helen said, important to lead your IEP in a way that works for you." The second session was captioned "Become an

Employment First Ambassador." During this session, Helen shared different aspects about her experience on serving in her role as an ambassador. She highlighted her experiences speaking to businesses, teachers and other students about the benefits of working. Mrs. North reflected, "It was a great day watching and listening to the stories of students and their employment journeys." Other students who participated in the conference included: Riley Coon, Bryce Miller, Lucas Tio, Amber Maresh and Holly Kind.









On February 20th, the New Auburn Math Department took two math teams to the 34th annual UW Eau Claire Math Meet. Students answered challenging math questions in both team and individual settings. DO NOT DO YOUR CHILDS HOMEWORK FOR THEM: "It's important that parents do not do a child's project or homework because the one doing the work is the one learning," Curtis said. "The only lesson learned by a parent doing a child's work is that the child loses confidence in his or her own abilities to independently complete the task assigned. While the grade might be better in the short term due to a parent's professional touch, the child will know that that grade was not earned through his or her own efforts -- even at a young age."

Homework may be the last thing your child wants to do, but a Kansas State University education expert says encouraging the habit of homework is important.

Laurie Curtis, assistant professor of curriculum and instruction at the College of Education, said doing homework helps children learn how to prioritize tasks and helps develop self-discipline.

"Homework leads children toward a path of independence," said Curtis, a former elementary school teacher. "It should be a time for a child to practice something he or she understands conceptually in order for it to be done with more ease and accuracy."

To keep children on track when doing homework, it's beneficial for them to find a quiet place equipped with the tools needed and to have access to a parent or older sibling in case questions arise. Curtis also recommends parents attend back-to-school orientations where teachers often explain their homework policy, and it's important to read classroom newsletters for information about work being done in the class.

To maintain a child's positive attitude about homework, parents might want to refrain from questioning a child about assigned homework first thing each night


"I think it's more important that a parent first ask what new ideas the child heard about, what good book he or she heard about in the library, etc., before the homework question is asked," Curtis Said. "It establishes a more positive tone about school. Rather than asking that yes/no question about having any homework, perhaps asking, 'What do you need to do to get ready for tomorrow at school,' might cause a child to think about assigned homework a bit more"
